Congratulations to the New Inn, Colchester, which was voted Essex County Pub of the Year only a couple of days before this piece was written. Honourable mentions go to first and second runners-up The Red Lion in Belchamp Otten, which headlines later in the NWE Pub News and CME PoTY The Hop Beer Shop in Chelmsford, which needs no further

explanation.

You'll remember my last editorial was mostly given over to CAMRA National Chairman Colin Valentine, and his appeal for as many members as possible to attend April's AGM and Conference in Bournemouth. I was one of over half a dozen members from our parish who made the voyage down to the south coast, and was both impressed and depressed at what I saw.

To get the bad news out of the way first, a cloud hung over proceedings in the form of a very recent personal attack by a well-known beer blogger on one of the executive committee; the sombre mood was then not improved by a schism between the committee and the membership present in the hall and further afield, which led to procedural changes made at the 2016 AGM being reversed. Finally, looking around me I was painfully aware of



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CAMRA's need somehow to reconnect with prospective young members, who are being lost to spirits, mixers and worse.

Now the good news; the workshop sessions bounced with the enthusiasm of those present. The appreciation of where CAMRA actually was, and where it wanted to get to in terms of societal 'mind-share' was fully realised by the volunteers leading the workshops. To some extent I found myself wishing that the entire weekend could have been made up of such sessions and I left each and every one both having learned something and more enthusiastic about spreading the good news of beer.

To my surprise, having banged on in previous editions of Thirsty Times about some challenges being faced by CAMRA as it tries to reinvent itself, very few of these actually surfaced at the conference; for example the question of how the cider lobby interact in future with the beer brigade was entirely unaddressed. Rather the keynote speech, given by Paul Chase of CPL Training, focussed on the existential threat we all face from the anti-drinking lobby. The neo-prohibitionists, as Paul cast them in his passionate address, were in danger of ruining the hobby for the responsible many, in the name of correcting the few real wrong-uns.

Part of the fight back against the neo-pros is to be a new organisation under the CAMRA umbrella, named 'Drinker's Voice'. I was going to write a far larger editorial-cum-article about Drinker's Voice but unfortunately further discussion has been embargoed by HQ in St Albans while the budget is set and scope and aims defined. One thought recurred again and again – could DV be the future home of our cider, perry and nascent gin efforts? If whisky is part of the mix – pun intended – count me in; mine's a neat Ledaig 15 y.o.

Finishing on a lighter note, later on in this Summer 2017

issue Claire Irons previews this year's Recommended Pub Guide; many of you will have seen the 'recommended' plaques, proudly displayed at pub entrances around the branch and further afield. Do you recognise this pub from its fearsome display of gongs?:



All is revealed in the aptly-named 'All about Ale', later....

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ALL CHANGE AT THE SUMMER BEER FESTIVAL

If you have been to the Chelmsford Summer Beer and Cider Festival before, you will definitely want to make a note of the dates (and book your annual leave!) for this year's festival. Running from Tuesday 4th July until Saturday 8th July, the festival will be open from noon until 11:00pm daily.

If this is your first year at the festival, you are in for a treat – relaxing in the sunshine in Admirals Park with over 350 real ales and more than 100 ciders, perries and pyders to choose from, as well as the ever popular foreign beer bar.

This year we have kept all the classic ingredients for a fantastic beer festival – great beers, a wide range of delicious food, live music and plenty of volunteers on hand to help – but we've added some new twists to make this year the best one yet!

For the first time we will be offering a small selection of keykeg beers. If you haven't had an opportunity to try beer served this way yet, here is your chance. There are 13 to choose from, so sample a few and you can decide whether you love the new tech or prefer the reliable cask.

This year we are shrinking our carbon footprint by not printing a festival programme and by banning the use of polystyrene and plastic by our caterers – it'll be all paper and wood based products.

Excitingly, in association with the Galvin Green Man, Howe Street, 100 people will have the chance to enjoy a free food and beer pairing starting at 3:00pm available Tuesday to Thursday only.

The Green Man is owned by the Michelin starred Galvin Brothers, so they are bound to keep your taste buds tingling.

CAMRA members will, as always, enjoy free entry to the festival. Entry costs for non-CAMRA members are Tuesday-Thursday free before 5:00pm and £2 after 5:00pm. Friday £2 before 5:00pm and £5:00 after 5:00pm. Entry all day Saturday is £2. You can become a CAMRA member at the festival and get your entry refunded and free entry for the rest of the festival week.



Putting on the festival takes 250 volunteers 2,000 planning hours and 10,000 man hours on site. There are lots of opportunities to get involved, and many different roles available. So if getting involved and enjoying free beer sounds appealing, do get in touch with us and we will be pleased to welcome you on board.

As well as serving beer, we also use the festival to serve our community by supporting two local guest charities. This year they are Essex Search and Rescue and Essex Dementia Care who will be joining us at the festival raising money and awareness for their causes. They are hoping to top last year's total of $\pounds10,000$.



The idea of this Easter weekend's outing was to do a walk along Springfield Road into town, do a presentation at the Railway Tavern and finish off at the Woolpack Beer Festival. So starting off at the Endeavour, it was very nice to meet up with a good group of members including a few who had made the trek from Witham and one from Colchester, all ready for the day's adventure.

A really warm welcome at the pub from new landlord Mike and he also had four good beers on offer including, in tip-top condition, the excellent Harvey's Sussex Best.

A little further along the Springfield Road we looked into The Red Lion which does advertise real ales; sadly none were on view at the bar, so it was a quick exit. We did however take note of their advert for B&B at £25 a night.

The Oddfellows Arms was next pub along the route. Again, we received a really nice welcome from the landlady and were glad to see a good selection of five on offer, including ales from Bishop Nick, Wibblers and Mighty Oak plus Cornwall's much-loved Betty Stoggs.



A little off-piste but the next pub we visited was the Riverside Inn. Alas, this very impressive weather-boarded pub on the river had only two ales on offer, Doom Bar and Young's Bitter. The food they were serving did, however, look very good.



The Railway Tavern was next on the list where Doug, our chairman presented Jo with their runner's-up award in this year's CME Pub of the Year competition. Eight real ales on offer, including the impressive Dark Times Milk Stout from Bishop Nick; unfortunately this ran out soon after our arrival but was soon replaced by the excellent Adnam's Oyster Stout.

After popping across the bicycle park for an obligatory visit to The Ale House, where the usual excellent range of ales and ciders were on offer, it was on to the Ivory Peg (JD Wetherspoon). Food was more the order of the day here than beer, but we found another good selection of ales on offer including local ones from George's, Brentwood and Bishop Nick. Cheapest ales in town especially with the 50p vouchers that are kindly distributed to CAMRA members as well.



Hop Beer Shop was the next pub on the tour and the usual warm and friendly welcome plus good selection of gravity fed ales and ciders was on offer.



We finished the day at the Woolpack Festival which was in full swing and very busy.

All in all, another good pub crawl tour and once again it highlighted the fact that we have some really excellent pubs in our fair city of Chelmsford.

Our first ever Town Pub of the Year award went to The Kings Arms, Saffron Walden. The certificate presentation took place on Thursday 23 March. "Policeman are looking younger!" was the cry of our ageing parents. We are amazed, and pleased by a few young landlords who do not fill the typical stereotype of older licensees.

In North West Essex we have the energetic Ashley Ball, joint licensee with his mother at the King's Arms. This multi-roomed, market town pub with welcoming open fires serves businesses at lunchtime, and a group of faithful locals by night. A function room hosting quiz nights and live music sessions ensures all visitors are greeted warmly.

Ashley left school in 2005 and is now 29. He studied Business in 6th form, but after school worked on building sites and the pub in the evenings, before moving into the pub fulltime. Always smiling and helpful, he listens to suggestions especially on beer range; thus there is often a dark (mild, stout or porter) as one of his 5 beers on hand pump plus a blonde, a bitter, a brown bitter or something new and interesting to taste.

Known as a fidget and not good at sitting still, he always feels he should at least be polishing glasses - maybe this is what helps him be a good publican! His favourite beers are golden and hoppy, interests include football (supporting Cambridge United), tasting new beers and travel when possible. His favourite food is an 8oz medium rare steak. 
The Compasses, Great Totham has won the Pub of The Year 2017 for the Maldon and Dengie Branch for the second year running.

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THE RIGHT KIND OF BEER

Alan Perryman previews this year's Epping and Ongar Railway Beer Festival For three days, heritage steam and diesel trains will amble through the forest, complete

From the 28th to 30th July, Epping & Ongar Railway's North Weald station will host its 5th beer festival. With the range of ales expanded to 65, this year the festival celebrates 60 years since the first tube train rolled through the Essex fields.





For three days, heritage steam and diesel trains will amble through the forest, complete with onboard 'Flag and Whistle' bar serving drinks until the last train after dusk. Classic Routemaster buses will provide transport to and from the festival site, with pick up points at Epping (Underground, Central Line) and Shenfield (TfL Rail and Greater Anglia). The transport options mean there is no need to designate a driver and bring the car! Bus services will be evenly spaced into the evening, the last Epping service leaving when the bar closes and a later Shenfield service than in 2016.



Drinkers will be treated to live music on Friday evening, Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon – if the last years are anything to go by, the late night trains will be harmonious affairs, filled with the sound of folk songs!

With the 60th anniversary of London's Underground just around the corner, this year's beer selection will feature many London and Essex breweries. Some beers will be brewed specially for the occasion and it is planned that a 60/- style will be on offer! A full list of ales and ciders will be published in advance, along with full details of the cuisine on offer. CAMRA members can purchase discounted entrance that include bus and festival train travel. Tickets are available on the day and for advance purchase at www. eorailway.co.uk.

CHELMSFORD AND MID-ESSEX

Mark Mcleod, manager of the White Horse, Chelmsford, has confirmed that the planning application to the council in January was to refurbish the flats upstairs and that his pub is definitely not under threat of closure. In fact he is excited to announce that he is due to marry Sian Phillips, manager of the Wine Cellar in Chelmsford in June. "This is a kind of licensed-trade take on the Billy Joel and Christine Brinkley story" he quipped; "She is a white upper-class mayor's daughter running a prestige town centre wine bar. I'm a black downtown lad from Melbourne whose claim to fame is that he has shaken hands with the Queen!!"



Mark has over thirty years experience running some of Chelmsford's most interesting establishments including The Hayloft Bar, the Countryman and the city's first nightclub Dee Jays. "I am pleased to say that the White Horse is still open and serving popular beers such as Oscar Wilde, Captain Bob and ever-changing live ciders. As you know, working in two separate places we don't get to see an awful lot of each other. But once married what a collaboration there could be. Watch this space...". Chelmsford and Mid-Essex CAMRA wish Sian and Mark well for their future together.

Wedding bells are also due to chime for Jo Green and Paul Teahon on 1st July so they apologise for closing the **Railway Tavern in Chelmsford** on their special day. Of course, the branch and their customers will not be too put out and wish them all the best for their married life and continued success.

Some people may be sad to see the Pullman upholstery disappear from this railway-themed pub, which has been refurbished in order to make the seating arrangements more flexible and allow more people to enjoy the back bar. See the social diary for an illustration of the new seats and benches at our Good Friday pub crawl tour - you won't recognise the old place!



Still in the West End of Chelmsford, the uniquelynamed **Royal Steamer** run by father and son team, both called Justin Healey, is due to close for a few weeks over the summer for refurbishments and will reopen with full pub opening hours and real ales on hand pump. Their sister pub, the **Kings Arms in Broomfield** reopened in April following refurbishment to have three handpumps: Adnam's Ghost Ship, Fuller's London Pride and a guest ale.

The Two Brewers in Chelmsford is being managed by a holding company so has limited opening hours. Hopefully it will fare better than the Bird in Hand which has recently closed.

The Eagle in Galleywood has re-opened, and joins five other pubs belonging to the new owner who has taken over the lease from Hawthorn Leisure. The delighted local villagers, known as the Eagle to Phoenix group, have fought a long battle to save their village pub and have it listed as an Asset of Community Value. With three hand pumps, pub grub including Sunday roasts and a thriving quiz scene it should be back as the hub of the village. The Landlords of the **Beehive Pub & Restaurant**, **Great Waltham** are celebrating their first anniversary with live music, BBQ and Bouncy Castle on Saturday 15th July from 1pm till late. As usual they will have their regular beers Greene King IPA and Abbott plus a guest ale. Kathryn Mead, the landlady is looking forward to a great party with fun for all the family.

The Flitch of Bacon in Little Dunmow is the only pub in the village. However as part of a recent revamp the hand pumps have been removed and it is now a restaurant rather than a gastropub.

Having gained ACV status it was a surprise to all that the Leather Bottle in Pleshey closed suddenly in April, with the departure of previous tenant Keith Flint of the band Prodigy. However owners Viv and Arthur Warren soon had another tenant, Rob, who re-opened the pub on Easter Monday.

The White Horse, Witham re-opened on Saturday 29th April. This dog-friendly pub has been refurbished inside and now also has a function room available for hire. Owned by Hawthorn Leisure, the pub has three hand pumps of which two were in use on opening day for Mighty Oak Oscar Wilde mild and Maldon Gold. The regular tipple is Greene King IPA and they have two guest ales but aren't doing food for a few weeks until the kitchen has been sorted out. It is jointly run by Phil Streetley and partner Carly Baker, formerly of the George in Witham, and Paul Baker who ran the Cross Keys in White Notley. We wish them good luck with their new venture and are pleased that they will stock Thirsty Times.

The Eagle in Braintree has extended opening hours from noon till midnight Monday to Sunday, so are now fully open on Mondays. Meals are served 12pm to 8pm Monday to Sunday. From Wednesday 24th May Marstons are replacing Matthew Clarke as the main supplier, which means that there will be no Greene King! Up to four changing beers will be offered, including one each from Adnam's and Marston's, one national and often a local beer. The pub is dog-friendly.

The Golden Lion, Braintree is being completely refurbished and should reopen in mid-August. Owner Glenn Akerman, also proprietor of Witham Brewery, will sell his No Name beer with a manager running the pub. The Horse and Groom in Braintree have a new head chef called Tony Price. He has cooked for more than ten years and apparently steak and ale pie has so far been their




best seller. The Swan in Bank Street, Braintree have applied to have three tables and nine chairs outside their pub, subject to council agreement.

From 24th May there will be an extra chef at the **Cross Keys in White Notley** with new meal times Monday to Saturday 12pm to 2.30pm, 6pm to 9.30pm and Sundays 12pm to 5pm.

MALDON & DENGIE PUB NEWS

Let's start with some good news. The extensive restoration work on the fire-damaged **King's Head in Bradwell-on-Sea** has been completed. Owner of the historic village inn Richard King and pub manager Mick Clay opened the doors in late April. The pub will serve three real ales from Essex breweries, and also offer good home-cooked food. It's been a long wait for the people of Bradwell to get their pub back, but I'm sure it will have been worth it. Richard King has spent a considerable sum on the restoration/rebuilding work and I was very impressed with what I saw in late March when I viewed the pub.

We have managed to get another of our local pubs listed as an Asset of Community Value. **The Red Lion in Latchingdon** has joined the growing list of pubs in the Maldon & Dengie Branch area that have achieved this status. It is the only pub in a large village, and local people would have to travel long distances to find an alternative if it were to close its doors for good in the future. New tenants will soon be taking over at the pub.

Now for some very sad news. It transpires that the pub company Hawthorn Leisure has sold the **Mitre in Wickham Bishops**, to a buyer who intends to convert the pub into a delicatessen and beauty salon! Planning permission will not be required for this change of use, due to permitted development rights which currently exist for pubs. Fortunately, new legislation has been passed which will soon remove these rights, but this will come too late to save the Mitre. There is now only one pub in Wickham Bishops, which is the **Chequers**.



The Bell in Tolleshunt Major, which is known locally as the "Beckingham Bell" is looking for new tenants. Gray & Sons are seeking expressions of interest to take over this attractive village local from Jan and Manfred Meier; the change is expected to take place in August.

The Ferry Boat Inn in North Fambridge has reopened following a short closure whilst refurbishment work was carried out on the pub, restaurant and hotel rooms. The new owners are Tony Lee and Jay Doogan; they recognised that the pub needed a makeover in order to encourage the locals to start frequenting it again.



The Mighty Oak Tap Room and Farmers Yard in Maldon's High Street have both recently announced longer opening hours. The Tap Room is now open from 12 noon until 11pm on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and the upstairs 'reading room' can now be used in the evenings. Farmers Yard now opens from 12 noon to 10pm Tuesday to Sunday.

Save the Railway Arms Pub (STRAP), Saffron Walden

The Railway Arms, Saffron Walden was registered as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) on 30th March 2017, the culmination of over two years' effort in the face of great opposition from owners who have run it down over the last 3 years, closed it down in January and now seemingly wish to see it developed for housing. ACV status gives us six months breathing space to organise, raise money and use the Community Right to Bid in an effort to buy the pub. STRAP has achieved its primary aim and now needs to give rise to a new organisation with the aim of providing a professionally-run community pub.

The proposed format is a Community Benefit Society (CBS) established by, and for the benefit of, the local community. Community shareholders would decide the management strategy and ensure it sells good quality food and drinks at reasonable prices. It would also aim to support the widest possible range of interest groups & organisations and provide facilities to help address local needs. A community share issue would raise capital towards meeting the cost of purchase, any renovation and refurbishment works. Total costs are estimated to be in the order of £400,000. Assistance may be available from a variety of sources including grant funding and community loans.

A public meeting was held in Saffron Walden Town Hall on Wednesday 19th April, with the intention of turning the Railway Arms into a thriving community owned pub. Over 130 people attended. Protection Group ACV are trying to achieve a successful sale of the business to the community group for the benefit of the community and for the preservation of the pub for future generations. The group now has until 27th August 2017 to complete fund-raising and submit a bid. During this time, any potential sale of the business must be to another community interest group or approved by The Kings Head Ridgewell Protection group ACV. After being converted by the Galvin brothers into possibly the most up-and-coming dining location in Essex the old place is, however, now unrecognisable.

Galvin Restaurants are a chain with eight restaurants in England, two in Scotland and one as far flung as Dubai, UAE. All are in up-market locations, which makes Chris and Jeff Galvin's choice of Great Waltham to join that select bunch all the more absorbing.

Founded by the brothers in 2005, the chain is positioned as "restaurants that are each unique, but sharing the common theme of high quality cuisine served in luxurious surroundings, with the USP of the presence of Chris or Jeff in their own restaurants creating a family experience".



The real ale tie-in comes in the form of the Galvin Green Man just having been awarded the title of 'Best Pub in Essex' by no less august an organ than the National Pub and Bar Awards. Browsing over to www.pubandbar.com as exhorted by Galvin's press release, you learn that these are the awards hosted by Pub and Bar Magazine, currently in the H2O Publishing stable.

The Galvin Green Man now apparently competes head-to-head with pubs in Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire, Hertfordshire, Norfolk and Suffolk in Pub and Bar's 'East of England' competition hosted at BAFTA in London. Sadly,

Billericay Brewing Company

Trevor writes: Early 2017 has been a very busy time for Billericay Brewing, brewing to full capacity for the past 3 months and plans are now afoot to increase capacity. Spring special ales Billericay Bees (made with local honey), Gold Sovereign (with UK Sovereign hops) and Norsey Gold (US dry



hopped) were all very popular in both bottle and cask. For May Mild Month, Mild Bill has made a reappearance along with a festival special Vanilla Bill with fresh vanilla added.

The next couple of beer festivals are now being planned. For Father's Day weekend (16th to 18th June) we have a mini beer festival in the micropub, featuring a dozen of our ales plus brewery tours on the Saturday and Sunday (booking essential). In addition we are brewing our traditional darker bitter My Old Man once again, as a perfect gift for dads. Then the next full beer festival will take place on 20th to 23rd July featuring twenty plus Essex beers and ciders over two bars in the micropub and brewery.

That went down extremely well with lots of anecdotal feedback that is was well received - we have limited stock in 500ml bottles still available. Our Milk Stout Dark Times (4.5%) came and went too (likewise still available in bottle).



We have introduced a brand-new core brand in bottle which will be available all year round. The limited number of casks have sold but we may well brew again later in the year. We have called it DIVINE and it is a 5.1% Premium Ale – a festival of English flavours featuring spice, nuttiness and caramel nodding to a celebrated Ridleys recipe of old. DIVINE is available now in Chelmsford Star Co-Ops as well as our regular bottle stockists. At time of writing we are selling our Dark Mild (3.7%) in support of CAMRA's Mild Month of May initiative. And keep a look out for our Revelry beer which will be ready in time for... REVELRY DAY!! – celebrate Father's Day at Bishop Nick. A family fun afternoon with real ale, hog roast and children's entertainment. This annual open brewery event will take place from midday-4pm on site in Braintree on Sunday 18th June 2017. Bring a rug, your shades and your dad!

Summer Beer Festival time is upon us. Cambridge Beer Festival is next up and then our stand is booked for CAMRA's Chelmsford Beer and Cider Festival of course (first week of July) and we'll have our beers at the Braintree Beer Festival too – amongst others. We're setting up stall at Cressing Temple for the Essex Food and Drink Festival on 15th and 16th July.

In an increasingly challenging market place we are pleased to say we are still getting new stockists. Since the last issue of Thirsty Times we have crossed the threshold of at least thirty new outlets with our cask and bottled ales. 
